Conejo Canyons Bridge Nears Completion

Two of the most popular Conejo Open Space Conservation Agency properties—the Conejo Canyons Open Space and Wildwood Regional Park—border each other.

Defining the boundary between them is the Arroyo Conejo, a waterway that represents some of the only riparian habitat left in the Conejo Valley.

While the Arroyo is beautiful and important ecologically, it is also a barrier to linking the two spaces. For trail users hoping to traverse the Conejo Canyons into Wildwood or vice versa, the only connection involves a lengthy walk along a paved service road. And for those who come to the area to get away from it all, touch grass, smell rain and look at flowers, trudging along Hill Canyon Road poses an obstacle to immersion in nature.

"Open space visitors do utilize that asphalt road, but the road wasn't designed to have people on it on foot or on bikes. It's a one-lane service road for big heavy trucks," COSCA analyst Anna Huber says. The vehicles are heading for the Hill Canyon Treatment Plant.

Now, however, the Thousand Oaks Department of Public Works, in collaboration with COSCA, is **near completion of the \$3.2 million Conejo Canyons Bridge that will provide a direct connection between trails in the Conejo Canyons and those in Wildwood**. COSF contributed \$30,000 to the early phases of the bridge's development. "We want to create a better visitor experience and in support of that COSF has been a donor to the project," Huber notes.

The need for a bridge was first identified in the 2009 COSCA Conejo Canyons Management plan. "From COSCA's point of view it is a really important visitor amenity because it will allow equestrians, cyclists and people on foot to access open space while staying on trails," Huber adds.

More than a decade in the conception, planning and execution, the bridge is expected to be completed by the beginning of the dry season. Made of steel and concrete, it is 140 feet long and 12 feet wide. In addition to use by hikers, cyclists, and equestrians, the bridge will be used by service vehicles traveling between the treatment plant and the Thousand Oaks Municipal Service Center. It will also facilitate COSCA Rangers' oversight of the two open spaces and provide an important alternative exit in the event of wildfire.

"We work very closely with our colleagues in Public Works and this collaborative project is beneficial for all bridge stakeholders," says Huber. "From their point of view, they get better connectivity between important city facilities. From our point of view, we get a really awesome visitor amenity."—*Sean Crommelin*

Update on 2024, 2025 COSF Scholarships

For the fourth year, COSF's Scholarship Committee is in the process of evaluating applications from Conejo Valley and Greater Ventura County high-school seniors who plan to pursue an environmental studies-related major at a two- or four-year college or university. The two college-bound students chosen will receive \$1,000 annually for up to \$4,000 in support. **The 2025 scholarship winners will be announced next month.**

Last year's winners of the third annual Conejo Open Space Foundation scholarships were **Avery Henson of Moorpark High School and Kaelin Carraway of Rancho Campana High School in Camarillo**. Avery is now in at North Carolina State University, working toward a dual degree in Nutrition Anthropology and Biological Engineering. Kaelin Carraway is at the University of California Davis, majoring in Environmental Science and Management. Before leaving Camarillo, she delivered the valedictorian speech at her high school graduation.

For 2024, two additional students were recognized with honorable mentions and a onetime award: **Isaac Tieu of Santa Susana High School in Simi Valley** and **Avrey Tokuyama of Westlake High School.** Past COSF Scholarship recipients are Daniel Conway, Naomi Lin, Alessandra Lucchesi and Molly McNulty, all of whom are working toward four-year degrees at colleges in California.

Scholarship Committee Chair Katrina Nolan speaks for all on the COSF Board when she says, "It is inspiring to see so many young people passionate about conservation and protecting the environment, physically and culturally. **COSF is ecstatic to be able to offer this scholarship to support the next generation of land stewards**."

- April 13, North Ranch Wishbone Trail Come explore this newer trail at the Westlake Community Park on this moderate 5-mile hike—maybe see some poppies! (3 hours)
- May 11, Backbone Trail Kanan Rd to Latigo Rd Moderate 4.5-mile out-and-back hike on a segment of the BBT. Gorgeous views and possible water crossings. (2.5 hours)
- June 8, Los Robles Los Robles West to Angel Vista Moderate 5-mile out-and-back hike starting from Potrero Rd to Angel Vista. There should be spectacular panoramic and ocean views! (3 hours)
